The University of California College of the Law, San Francisco (“UC Law SF,” formerly “UC Hastings”) seeks to hire six entry-level or lateral tenure-track faculty members to begin the 2024-2025 academic year, i.e., July 1, 2024. We seek innovative and productive scholars and talented teachers who will be role models for our students.

UC Law SF seeks scholars focused in any area who are able to teach a 1L class and also cover courses in one or more of the following areas as to which we have specific lines to fill: criminal law (2 lines), employment law, health law (2 lines), and international law. One of the criminal law lines is dedicated to someone capable of and interested in teaching the [Criminal Practice Clinic](#).

Applicants should have a serious interest in UC Law SF and living in the San Francisco Bay Area. Candidates should send a CV, statement of research and teaching interests, prior teaching evaluations, and representative publications in .pdf format to Professor [Ben Depoorter](#) Appointments Committee Chair (appointments2023@uchastings.edu) with the subject heading “Faculty Position.” All candidates must hold a J.D., Ph.D., or equivalent degree prior to start date. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience. We will conduct initial screening interviews (involving presentation of a scholarly work) for select candidates via Zoom and/or on-campus, with a second round of interviews and paper discussion for leading candidates on campus. We will begin considering applications as early as June 20, on a rolling basis.
